
Middle School Student Showcase is set for April 16

THANK YOU to parents, staff, and community members who attended our February Community & Staff Conversations!

The Pardeeville Area School District held Community & Staff Conversations on Facility Needs on February 20, 21, and 28 (including a virtual session) with total participation of **75+ attendees.**

Six focus categories were presented, along with the existing conditions within the district and how these spaces can look in modern educational and professional environments. **Attendees prioritized categories** in the below order of importance:

- 1. Food Service & Cafeterias
- 2. Career & Technical Education (CTE)
- 3. Educational Adequacy
- 4. Support, Safety & Accessibility
- 5. Physical Education & Athletic Support
- 6. School & Community Pride

Participants voted on the top three categories they felt the district should prioritize. Most respondents identified **Food Service & Cafeterias, CTE, and Educational Adequacy** as their **highest priorities.** School & Community Pride received the least amount of votes.

The Pardeeville Area School District recently welcomed back Andy Goebel and Kemal Kirchmeier, two Pardeeville High School alums who returned to their alma mater to impart knowledge and inspiration upon the current student body.

In February, Goebel, a 2015 graduate of Pardeeville High School and now a preparator at Carthage College, graciously shared his expertise with students in Mrs. Osterhaus' science classes at Pardeeville Middle School. Having completed a paleontology field course in Montana during his college years, Goebel captivated students with tales of his experiences at various dig sites. He told the students the distinctions between paleontology and archeology and recounted his involvement in uncovering both animal fossils and human artifacts.

Currently pursuing his Medical Doctor degree at The University of Wisconsin School of Medicine and Public Health, Kemal is dedicated to serving rural communities like Pardeeville. Pick up your child's medications when school year is complete

lease remember to pick up your child's medications in June, at the end of the school year. Looking ahead to the 2024-25 school year, please be complete and as accurate as possible when filling out any forms for your child, on either a paper copy or online. Also, if your child is going to see their medical provider, check to see if they are in need of a vaccination, a health plan, or a medication form. It is best to have one stop and be done! As always do not hesitate to contact the nurses with any questions or concerns.

Spring is in the air and with it comes many allergies. The best way of course, to not have an allergic reaction, is to not have the allergen around you. However, often we can not stop the pollen and dander. The next best way to help yourself is to wash it off and taking a shower is a good way to get the allergen out of your hair and off your skin. Washing also includes drops for your eyes and mist sprays or neti pots for your nose. (If you make your own solution, make sure you boil and cool the water used to prevent a possible severe infection.)

Taking a shower or bath before bed helps to keep the pollen and dander away from your bedding. Keeping clothes and bedding washed also helps to decrease the allergens. Air purifiers are also helpful as long as you follow proper maintenance guidelines. When these steps do not

give relief, there are many antihistamines to choose from. Always, read the labels carefully and consult your doctor before taking any medication for your allergies.

Untreated allergies may lead to asthma and there is allergic asthma. The best asthma plan for you is a plan you can do and a plan that controls your symptoms. To accomplish this, you need to work closely with your medical provider. This may include several visits to get it right.

Young children can take an active role in their asthma by being taught to ask an adult for help when they are having trouble. Inhalers are most helpful when they are kept close to where your child is going to be. Prevention is the key to allergies and asthma.

Ice-fishing team finishes 28th at state championship

The Pardeeville High School ice-fishing team had an up-and-down season. The Bulldog anglers spent much of the winter waiting for it to get cold enough for safe ice to form on area lakes, but once that happened, the team made the best of its shortened season.

The team officially qualified to compete in the Wisconsin Interscholastic Fishing Association State Championships by catching 488 inches of fish – well over the 200 inch qualifying mark – during a state-qualifying event in early January. Due to poor ice conditions, this year state championship was changed to a virtual event, which meant the team could fish on any public ice in the state of Wisconsin on one of four days (Feb. 17, 18, 24 or 25).

The Pardeeville team chose to fish on Saturday, Feb. 24 and it finished its day of fishing with just shy of 400 inches of fish. When all 55 teams in the state had their fish totaled, Pardeeville ended up in 28th place overall. Neenah finished as the 2024 state champion with 554.75 inches of fish.

Pardeeville boys basketball wins conference championship


It was a memorable season for the Pardeeville boys basketball program, as the varsity Bulldogs won 20 games and won the first conference championship since 2018.

The Bulldogs finished 12-2 in Trailways West Conference play, which tied for the top spot with Randolph. The strong season led to Pardeeville getting the No. 1 seed in ts side of the sectional for postseason play, but the playoffs came to an early end, as Poynette upset the Bulldogs, 71-63 in a regional semifinal game on March 1.

The Bulldogs were led by senior Austin Hohn, who averaged 19.8 points per game. He was especially dangerous from long range, as he made 85 of his 175 3-point attempts. In his final season with the Bulldogs, Hohn was named the Player of the Year in the Trailways West Conference while also earning Honorable Mention All-State honors in Division 4 from the Wisconsin Basketball Coaches Association.

Hohn was one of four players to earn recognition on the All-Trailways West Conference Teams. Earning a spot on the league's second team were juniors Eli Achterberg and Caleb Gard, while junior Jamison Wickersham received honorable mention.

Achterberg averaged 12.2 points, 5.3 rebounds and 3.6 assists per game this

The Pardeeville High School boys and girls curling teams finished their seasons competing at the Wisconsin High School Curling Championships at the Wausau Curling Club on Feb. 16-17.

The Pardeeville girls curling program featured eight varsity-caliber curlers this season, which allowed it to send two teams to the state championships. Leading the charge for the Bulldogs in Wausau was the Pardeeville 2 Girls Team, which finished among the top four teams in the state. The team of Maddy Harvey, Autumn Fischer, Allie Gawel and Kiana Berry picked up wins over Portage (6-5) and DC Everest (9-7) in pool play to advance all the way to the state semifinals before losing to a Poynette team that went on to win its third straight state championship.

Three Bulldogs place at state wrestling championships

The Pardeeville wrestling team put together another exciting postseason run, qualifying four individuals for the WIAA State Individual Wrestling Tournament, with three of those wrestlers landing on the podium with top-six finishes.

The Bulldogs were led by junior William Becker. The three-time state qualifier entered the state tournament with a perfect 53-0 record. After earning a first-round bye, Becker advanced to the semifinals in Division 3 at 175 pounds with a 13-2 major decision victory over Markesan's Treston Eckstein. In the semifinals, Becker suffered his first loss of the season, dropping a 5-2 decision to David Malin of La Crosse Aquinas. Becker bounced back with a 13-0 major decision victory in the consolation semifinals, but had to settle for fourth place after losing the third-place match to Nash Banko of Oostburg, 3-2.

Pardeeville sophomore Kingston Galetka qualified for the state tournament for the second straight year. Galetka went 2-2 at the Kohl Center in Madison and finished with a 46-3 record on the season. Galetka finished in 6th place in Division 3 at 144 pounds after a 9-1 major decision victory over Shiocton's Jordan Jahnke in the fifth-place match. The victory over Jahnke was especially sweet, as it avenged a loss in the quarterfinals, where Jahnke pinned Galetka in the second period.

Junior Caleb Mackey was Pardeeville's third wrestler to place at the state tournament. In his state-tournament debut, Mackey went 2-3 and finished in sixth place overall. His pin over Clear Lake's Tyler Sunday got Mackey to the fifthplace match, but he had to settle for sixth following a loss that finished his season with a 53-6 overall record.

Pardeeville freshman Dominic Garcia was Pardeeville's fourth state qualifier, but his state tournament came to an early finish when he lost an 8-2 decision to Iowa-Grant/ Highland's Tyson Imhoff in the opening round. Garcia finished his first varsity season with a 46-5 record.

Other highlights for Pardeeville included both Becker and Mackey picking up their 100th career victories during the season. During the regular season, Pardeeville finished third in the Trailways North Conference with a 4-2 conference record in dual meets. At the Trailways Conference Meet, held on Feb. 3, Pardeeville finished third overall out of 14 teams.

Pardeeville crowned four individual champions at the conference meet, with Galetka, Garcia, Mackey and Becker all winning their respective weight divisions. Pardeeville sophomore Cameron McManis also earned honorable mention in the conference by finishing third at 285 pounds at the conference meet.

During the 2023-24 season, the Pardeeville girls basketball team featured more youth than it has in recent seasons, but that didn't stop the Bulldogs from racking up the victories. Pardeeville finished the recentlycompleted season with an 11-3 record in the Trailways West Conference, good for second place in the league. Pardeeville ended up 16-8 overall with a team that was heavy in junior and sophomore players.

The Bulldogs will graduate three seniors from the program: Aubrey Maass, Lauren Weisensel and Isabella Hineman. The loss of Maass will be especially big, as the senior averaged 18.3 points per game in her final season in a Pardeeville uniform, earning herself a unanimous First Team All-Trailways West Conference selection. 
