Annual program at Pardeeville Elementary School held in November

On Tuesday, Nov. 21, the students and staff at Pardeeville Elementary School showed their patriotism while honoring area veterans at the school's annual Veterans Day Breakfast program.

Veterans and their families were greeted by a crew of flag-waving kindergarten students when arriving, and then enjoyed a breakfast of jumble waffles that were prepared by Taher Inc., the district's food-service partner. The breakfast was delivered to each table by members of the Pardeeville Elementary School's student council. Nick Sosa of the United States Army, who along with his wife and three kids, moved to Pardeeville from Sun Prairie a few years ago. Sosa talked about some of his experiences while serving in the military. Sosa's parting message during his speach was that "every veteran is a story." Sosa encouraged all the veterans in attendance to share their stories with the younger generations.

Plenty to celebrate as another school year flies by

t has been a busy three months since we kicked off the new school year and now we are closing out 2023 and preparing to welcome 2024. You have all heard the phrase "time flies" applied in many cases, but none so perfectly as a school

As we approach the end of the calendar year, there are also a few other items to share with all community members:

State report cards

The Wisconsin Department of Education released its annual school and district report cards on Tuesday, Nov. 14, and the Pardeeville Area School District Meets Expectations. Pardeeville Elementary and High Schools each Exceeds Expectations and Pardeeville Middle Meets Expectations.

The Wisconsin school report card system measures academic achievement using student assessments like the Wisconsin Forward Exam and ACT. In addition, the report card measures growth, target group outcomes, and the number of students who are on-track to graduate. The Department of Public Instruction (DPI) is required by state statute (Wis. Stat. 115.385) to generate school and district report cards for every publicly-funded school and district in the state. The current school report card is primarily based on last year's performance on the state assessments during the 2022-23 school year. The state assessments used for the Report Cards are just one snapshot of data from one point and time. Our district assessments provide us with much more meaningful information to track student progress.

More details and individual report cards can be found at https://apps2. dpi.wi.gov/reportcards/. We continue to show solid academic achievement and provide well-rounded students with not only a focus on academics, but athletics, the arts and service.

School finances and property taxes

As the tax-levy season is upon us and the levy and mill rate for the 2023–2024 school year has officially been set, it might be helpful to communicate the tax-levy information and some of its related components. We want to help our local stakeholders have a better understanding about district financing, as these items can often be very confusing or even frustrating to understand.

To briefly summarize public school funding, school districts obtain operating funds through two major sources: general aid from the State of Wisconsin and property taxes from district residents. There are a few smaller sources that provide some operational funds, however state aid and property taxes are the two largest sources of operational funding for all Wisconsin school districts. The sum of money is distributed among all school districts statewide based on several factors, with the main factors being property values, student enrollment, and shared costs.

The simplified school funding formula is: Revenue Limit - State Aid = Local Taxes

Summarizing school finance formulas can be challenging, but there are a couple elements that can be helpful for any community members to be aware of.

To begin with, there are two terms vou often hear mentioned when discussing school finance: tax levy and mill rate. The school tax levy is the amount of money that the school district needs to collect in property taxes each school year. The tax levy is determined by subtracting all known revenue that the District anticipates it will receive from the total proposed budget. Examples of school district revenue sources are State Aid. Medicaid Reimbursement, use of Fund Balance and Reserves, and other local revenue sources such as ticket sales. gifts and donations, etc. The other term, mill rate, is how much money a homeowner owes per \$1,000 of assessed property value.

The Pardeeville Area School District also saw property growth of 12.50 percent during the past year. Between the decrease in property taxes and the increase in property growth the mill rate for the school district dropped from \$7.18 per thousand dollars of property value in 2022-23 to \$6.68 per thousand dollars of property value in 2023-24. This is a 7.00 percent decrease. This is the lowest mill rate the school district has had in 30 years.

What does this mean for the average property tax payer in the Pardeeville Area School District? In 2022-23 if you had a piece of property worth \$150,000 you paid \$1,251 in school taxes. This year based on the growth

in property, that property is now worth \$225,000 and you will pay \$1,503 in school taxes, an increase of \$67 due to the large jump in property value. Please note that this is an average for the entire school district and the impact on property taxes will be different in each municipality.

One final piece of information mentioned earlier is that student enrollment is a major factor in school funding and one very positive note is that our school district enrollment has remained stable, which is great news! Many school districts across the state have seen sharp decreases in their overall enrollment which leads to less funding.

However, what we did see this year was an increase in open enrollment out. Interestingly, most of those students have never attended our school district. Instead, they have moved



within school district boundaries and have opted to stay with their current school district. All these factors play an important role, because on the third Friday every September, school districts are required to tabulate and report to the WI DPI their student counts. This third-Friday count is a major contributing factor to the funding formula for General Aid.

Again, funding in Wisconsin's public schools is complex. Unfortunately, the state's biennial budget for 2023-25 does not adequately fund public education and public schools, including Pardeeville which results in a reliance on more money from our local taxpayers. Yes, the State did increase revenue limits and provide additional per pupil funds with this biennium budget, but it does not make up for two years of zero increases to district revenues from 2021-23 and one-time funding schools received. We need to pay our bills, maintain facilities, and attract and retain staff.

As we continue through this school

year, and into the future, our administrative team and Pardeeville Board of Education will continue to work tirelessly to find ways to continually be stewards of state and local funding for our school and community to thrive.

In closing, I hope everyone will enjoy the winter break. Students will be off school from Monday, December 25 through Tuesday, January 2. School will be back in session on January 3, 2024. My own family and I wish every student, family, and community member a wonderful end to 2023 and a great start to 2024. We continue to accomplish great things for our students because of each and every #PardeevilleProud person in our community.


Giving Tree needs your help to provide holiday cheer to area families

Students recogized for academics, service to their community



Bulldogs run at state championships again

Led by senior Colin Smith, team finishes 8th at state meet

The Pardeeville boys cross country team enjoyed another stellar season under the direction of head coach Wes Babcock, not only winning a third straight Trailways Conference championship, but qualifying to run at the WIAA State Cross Country Championships for the second year in a row and the fifth time in program history.

At the state championships, which were run on Saturday, Oct. 28 in Wisconsin Rapids, the Pardeeville boys finished in eighth place out of 16 teams in Division 3. The Bulldogs finished with 172 points, and were just five points behind seventh-place Stevens Point Pacelli, and eight points back of sixth-place Phillips.

Leading the way for Pardeeville in the final cross country race of his prep career was senior Colin Smith. Smith finished in 12th place overall with a school record time of 16 minutes, 46.3 seconds. Other finishers for Pardeeville included junior Will Becker in 23rd (17:00.5), junior Brody Motsenbocker in 50th (17:34.2), junior Nicholai Undraitis in 100th (18:44.2), sophomore Mason Muscanero in 103rd (18:48.3), junior Brecken Helm in 140th (20:19.5) and junior Walker Wheeler in 142nd (20:21.8).

Pardeeville qualified for the state meet by finishing in second place at the WIAA Division 3 Poynette Sectional run on Friday, Oct. 20. The Bulldogs nearly knocked off Fennimore at the sectional, finishing just seven points back of the sectional champions. Pardeeville's 60 points were 72 points better than third-place Boscobel. Smith once again led the way at the sectional, finishing second in 17:10.83. Motsenbocker wasn't far

behind, finishing third, while Becker was seventh.

At the Trailways Conference Meet, which was held on Thursday, Oct. 12 in Princeton, Pardeeville beat runnerup Dodgeland by 20 points to take the top spot. Smith was the individual conference champion, winning the race in 16:53.73. Joining him on the All-Trailways Conference First Team were Motsenbocker, who finished second, and Bekcer, who placed third. Muscanero ended up on the second team after finishing 10th, while Undraitis earned honorable mention for his 15th place finish.



The Pardeeville football team finsihed the season with a 4-5 overall record and ended up tied for fifth in the Trailways Conference. The team had 10 players earn all-league honors in the Trailways Conference.

Bulldogs have 10 players earn all-league recognition

Shortly after the completion of the football season, the Pardeeville varsity football team had an impressive 10 players selected to be on the All-Trailways Conference Team for 2023. Leading the postseason honors for the Bulldogs were juniors Jamison Wickersham and Logan Young, who were both All-Trailways Conference First Team selections.

Wickersham was selected as a wide receiver after catching 27 passes for 568 yards and seven touchdowns this season. Young, who was Pardeeville quarterback this season, was selected at the offensive flex position. Young threw for 1,025 yards and 12 touchdowns, while serving as Pardeeville's leading rusher on the season, running for 947 yards and 17 touchdowns.

Landing on the All-Trailways Conference Second Team for Pardeeville were senior Logan Schmidtke along with juniors Caleb Gard, Ashton Whitehorse and Young. Schmidtke was selected as an offensive lineman. He helped pave the way for an offense that averaged 28.3 points and 214.4 rushing yards per game this season. Gard was selected at the defensive flex position. He led Pardeeville in tackles with 85, and also recorded two sacks and an interception. Whitehorse was selected at inside linebacker. He recorded 74 tackles and recovered a fumble. Young was on the second team as a punter after averaging 31.8 yards per punt.

Earning honorable mention on the

All-Trailways Conference list for Pardeeville were offensive linemen Cameron McManis, James Morgan and Carter Ploessl, along with defensive back Caleb Mackey, defensive end Brayden Bezzi and Wickersham as a special teams player.

Pardeeville finished the season with a 4-5 overall record and was tied for fifth in the conference with a 2-5 league record. After winning just one game a year ago, Pardeeville will look to continue its climb next season – the second under head coach Bobby Harry – when it will return eight of the 10 players who earned all-conference honors this season.

Students get hometown history lesson from Mr. Haynes

Walking field trip included stops at Pardeeville's historic places and buildings

The 3rd grade students at Pardeeville Elementary School took advantage of a nice fall day in early October when they went on a walking field trip to downtown Pardeeville. Serving as the tour guide for the trip was Pardeeville Village President Mike Haynes, who before retiring, worked in the Pardeeville Area School District as a guidance counselor at the middle school, as well as our varsity football and high school curling coach.

The group made a number of stops while walking through town, with Mr. Haynes showing the kids some of the historic buildings and places in Pardeeville. One of the first stops was the First Presbyterian Church, which was founded in 1857. Mr. Haynes then showed the students where the railroad tracks used to go through Pardeeville. The students then headed to the Angie W. Cox Public Library, where they learned about the history of that building, as well as the old Belmont Hotel, which is across the street next to the Kwik Trip.

The students also got to check out the old mill stone that currently sits near the fountain outside the library. That mill stone was found in the water near the spillway between Park Lake and Spring Lake near the current Carol's Cones. The students walked down to the spillway, where Mr. Haynes talked about the old mill that was built there when settlers arrived along the Fox River here in Pardeeville.

Art students use fire barrel to create ceramic pottery

Mr. Lynch's 3D Art and Advanced 3D Art classes at Pardeeville High School recently created some beautiful ceramic pottery using an unconventional process that saw them firing their pots outdoors with a fire barrel.

Pots were hand built using coil construction and then made smooth and shiny, burnishing the pots with coats of "terra sigillata," a very smooth, lustrous coating of clay which resembles a glaze and is virtually waterproof. Once complete, the pots were dried and placed in the burn barrel. Sawdust, wood, leaves and other organic materials were added until the barrel was full, and then set on fire. Salt, baking soda and other minerals can be added to promote more color variations on the surface of the pots.

Once all the materials burned and cooled, the pots were removed and inspected. Occasionally pots will crack, or break, as they are fired, so students learned to use an ancient Japanese technique called Kintsugi "golden joinery." Kintsugi is the Japanese art of repairing broken pottery by mending the areas of breakage with urushi lacquer dusted or mixed with powdered gold, silver or platinum. As a philosophy, it treats breakage and repair as part of the history of an object, rather than something to disguise or discard. Mr. Lynch and students were very pleased with the results.





Mr. LeMay and Mr. Housner went over items listed on the facility study that could get done and categorized them in different groups to indicate if part of a possible referendum, items that the school district will take care of and items not a priority. Mr. LeMay did indicate that costs for repairs and maintenance are still going up and have to think long term.

Board Member Attending the State Education Convention (January 17-18, 2024)

Board members indicated their continued support of going to the convention and the registration for this will be submitted.

Board Comments & Questions

Mr. Hees thanked the schools for setting up the Youth Alive presentation to the students and public. It was a great event for all who attended and showed that the staff are there for the students for whatever situation happens. Mr. Bell wanted to recognize Jesse Kath who also helped in setting up these events. Ms. Pufahl stated that the Lions Club screened around 473 students for the elementary school and middle school for eyesight. The gentleman running it said he had not seen better behavior than what our students were exhibiting and the staff members helping out were very organized and helpful, and he is taking some of their best practices to other businesses. Mr. Achterberg talked about the Trap Co-Op team asking for better communication to them and relaying their information out to the students and school district. Ms. Levzow talked about FFA going to the National Convention and receiving a 2 gold star award which is a huge accomplishment. There were over 79,000 FFA members who attended the convention.
