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

Parent-teacher conferences will be Oct. 24 and 26

Parent-teacher conferences in the Pardeeville Area School District will be held on Tuesday, Oct. 24 and Thursday, Oct. 26, in all three schools in the district. The conferences will take place between 4 to 8 p.m. on both days.

Pardeeville Elementary School, information on how to sign up for a specific time slot with your child's teacher will be coming home with your child soon.

At Pardeeville Middle School, parents of students in grades 5 and 6 should sign up for a specific time slot. Your child's teacher will be sending home information on how to sign up for those time slots soon. If you are parent of a student in grades 7 or 8, all conferences are on a walk-in basis. You will be able to stop in on either day between 4 and 8 p.m. and talk to your child's teachers.

At Pardeeville High School, conferences don't need to be scheduled in advance. Parents are invited to stop in either day between 4 and 8 p.m. and meet with any of their children's teachers.

If you have any questions, you are encouraged to reach out to your child's principal.

The first week of October is School Board Appreciation Week. I want to share my appreciation to Margo, Becky, Karla, Justin, Bret, Chad and Paul for their dedication to our students and working to make the Pardeeville Area School District a school district that everyone can be #PardeevilleProud of. We are very fortunate to have the schools and staff we do, and those you elected to lead the district have done a wonderful job for all of us and will continue to help chart a course for the future of the school district.

Speaking of the future, during the Fall of 2022 the Pardeeville School Board approved a new District Strategic Plan developed through our Community Conversation and collaboration with various stakeholders. One of the areas that was highlighted was the need for our district to understand the current facility conditions of each school, the needs of our campus, and the future growth of the school district. During this process the Board talked openly about evaluating and planning for school facilities in both the short and long-term.

In the Winter of 2023 the school district started a comprehensive facilities assessment that was the first step in a long-range planning process for our district. The District partnered with architectural firm Groth Design Group and construction management company Findorff Construction to assess the current condition, capacity, utilization, and educational functionality of our buildings, as well as identify preliminary cost estimating for any identified improvement, repair, and maintenance needs.

This data has helped us begin to de-

velop an understanding of the state of our facilities and start the conversation on next steps, including possible larger facility projects.

At their September 18, 2023 school board meeting the Board made the decision to go forward with further facility and master planning and approved a timeline that allows for a possible 2025 facility referendum if that is a direction they wish to pursue.

However, before making any decisions about potential larger future projects or referendums, we will be soliciting input and feedback from all Pardeeville Area School District stakeholders including staff, parents, community members, and students. Stay tuned for more information coming this fall. The facility study can be accessed on the school district website, or you can read a summary of the findings in this newsletter (pages 4 & 5).

Please take time to enjoy the change of seasons and thank you for taking the time to read this newsletter and learn about all the great things going on in our school district.

hard work our community completed during our strategic planning efforts which were approved by the Board of Education in December 2022. The plan focuses on five pillars that are necessary to support the district's future. Each pillar identifies key areas to address with specific goals, outcomes and action plans. We want to provide an update on Pillar No. 3: Facilities & Operations.

Earlier this year, the Pardeeville Area School District engaged architectural and construction management partners to perform a district-wide assessment of existing facilities to understand our maintenance needs and costs, building capacity limitations, and educational goals and priorities impacting our facilities.

This study was accepted and approved by the Board



of Education in June 2023. Within the report, which can be accessed on our website or by following the QR code, there is detailed information about the district, each school and related facilities, staff input, and capital mainte-

nance budget estimates.

As we continue to focus on our facilities and operations pillar, we are sharing a high-level summary of the nearly 200-page existing facility study report.

Educational Adequacy and Capacity Report Findings

As part of the facility study report completed earlier this year, a review of the space utilization and suitability to support education was performed. Below are **some** of the findings:

Pardeeville Elementary School | Opened in the 1930s with additions in 1959 and 1993

- Many classrooms have exceeded the recommended class size.
- A number of classrooms will not support a grade with a total class size of more than 80 students.
- Spaces, such as kindergarten, intervention, special education, and counseling are not optimally sized or configured for the desired use.
- The stage and locker room are underutilized spaces that are not easily accessed except through the gymnasium, limiting options for other uses.



Pardeeville Elementary School originally opened in the 1930s with additions in 1959 and 1993.

Pardeeville Middle School | Opened in 1993 with an addition in 2004 & Balliet Building | Purchased in 1986 from Columbia County; Original construction date in 1950s or 1960s

- Balliet building, which helps address some classroom space needs, does not have rooms adequately sized or configured for education, and has security and accessibility challenges.
- Limited spaces to support intervention, conferencing, and student and staff collaboration.
- Many classrooms are at their maximum recommended capacity.
- Lacks appropriately dedicated food service or cafeteria space.
- The gymnasium is undersized, limiting functionality, utilization, and safety.

Pardeeville High School | Originally designed as an elementary school in 1965 with additions in 1966, 1974, 1993, 2004 and 2018

- Circulation routes are narrow and heavily congested since the building was originally designed as an elementary school.
- Many interior walls between classrooms are temporary partitions and don't provide appropriate acoustic separation or support for technology.
- Agricultural education lacks instruction space and an appropriate location, which limits its ability to support diverse materials, activities, and curriculum.

- Foods program does not have sufficient kitchen stations and storage to support desired educational programming.
- Cafeteria food service uses aging equipment and does not provide adequate space to serve students as efficiently as desired.
- The gymnasium space is highly utilized from 8 a.m. until 9 p.m. which translates into later than optimal practice times for students and prevents community and club use.


Capital Maintenance Report Findings and Costs

The existing facility study identified capital maintenance needs by category through non-invasive techniques. The categories included:

- Building Envelope and Roofs: All exterior portions of a building such as windows, roofing, foundations, brick, caulking, etc.
- Systems (Mechanical, Electrical, Plumbing): Includes systems such as fire alarm, fire protection, piping, plumbing, lighting, and HVAC systems.
- Interiors: All aspects of the inside finishes of the space such as ceilings, flooring, finish woodwork, etc.
- Site: All items that are not directly related to the buildings such as storm sewer, athletic fields, playgrounds, and landscaping.
- ADA/Accessibility: Includes interior and exterior items such as accessible paths, fixtures, and equipment to ensure compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) of 1990.

Next Steps

On September 18, 2023, the Board of Education approved long-range

planning toward potential April 2025 facilities and operational referendums. The district will engage our stakeholders in Community Conversations and a district-wide survey that will ask questions related to potential facility improvements and renewing our non-recurring operational referendum that the Pardeeville Area community has supported in the past.



Before returning from the tour, each student received a bag of Alsum Farms potatoes to take home.





Let's make sure kids have safe transportation to school

The Pardeeville Area School District, along with the district's transportation partner, Smith Bus Company, are proud to join schools across the nation in celebrating National Bus Safety Week, taking place Oct. 16-20. This annual event serves as a reminder of the importance of school bus safety and aims to educate students, parents and the community about best practices for ensuring safe transportation to and from school.

National Bus Safety Week provides an excellent opportunity to underscore the commitment of the Pardeeville Area School District to the safety and well-being of our students. We encourage parents, students, and community members to participate actively in promoting bus safety by adhering to these essential safety tips:

- 1. Arrive at the Bus Stop Early: Being punctual helps ensure a smooth and safe boarding process.
- 2. Stand Back from the Road: While waiting for the bus, students should stand at least five giant steps (approximately 10 feet) away from the edge of the road.
 - 3. Wait for the Bus to Stop: When

the bus arrives, students should wait for it to come to a complete stop before approaching or attempting to board.

4. Use Handrails: When boarding and exiting the bus, students should always use the handrails and take one step at a time.

- 5. Stay Seated and Face Forward: While on the bus, students must remain seated at all times and face forward.
- 6. Listen to the Bus Driver: Students should always listen to and follow the instructions of the bus driver.
- 7. No Horseplay: Roughhousing, pushing, or throwing objects on the bus can be dangerous.
- 8. Stay Clear of the Danger Zone: When getting off the bus, students should take at least five giant steps away from the front of the bus and wait for the driver's signal before crossing the road.
- 9. Use Crosswalks: When crossing the road to or from the bus stop, students should use designated crosswalks if available and look left, right, and left again before proceeding.

Drivers who approach school buses on the street should also remember to keep a safe distance, as buses make frequent stops. Drivers should also respect the stop sign when it is deployed and flashing, stay alert, watch for pedestrians and be patient to make sure all our kids remain safe when getting on and off their school buses.



Bulldog boys cross country team keeps rolling

One year after qualifying for the WIAA State Championships and winning the Trailways Conference Championship for the second year in a row, the Pardeeville boys cross country team is at it again. The 2023 Bulldog boys team is once again crushing the competition, having finished in first place in four of the seven meets it has competed in during the months of August and September.

The Pardeeville boys returned home as the champions of Pioneer Invitational (Aug. 28), the Poynette Invite (Sept. 7), the Dana Waddell Invite (Sept. 12) and the Westfield Classic (Sept. 21).

The Pardeeville boys have been led all season by the trio of Will Becker, Colin Smith and Brody Motsenbocker. Becker has won individual championships at the Pioneer Invitational and the Poynette Invite. He was also third at the Dana Waddell Invite and fifth at the Portage Invite. Smith was Pardeeville's top runner at the Westfield Classic, finishing second, and at the Rio Invite, where he finished fifth. Motsenbocker has finished in the top 10 in five of seven races so far this season, including a fifth place at the Westfield Classic.

Pardeeville success hasn't gone unnoticed, as the Bulldogs have been ranked all season in the Wisconsin Cross Country Coaches Association Coaches Poll. They were ranked as high as fifth in Division 3, and were ranked ninth during the final week of September.

The Pardeeville boys will be going for their third straight conference championship when they compete at the Trailways Conference Championship on Thursday, Oct. 12 at Princeton High School. The boys will be trying to return to the state meet when they run at the Division 3 Poynette Sectional, which will take place on Friday, Oct. 20 at the Shepherds Meadow Golf Course, starting at 4 p.m. Pardeeville will need to finish in

Pardeeville's push to qualify for the WIAA football playoff was scheduled to continue with road games at Cambria-Friesland (Sept. 29) and Randolph (Oct. 6) before finishing up with a home game against Johnson Creek (Oct. 13).


