Bostad currently serves as the offensive line coach and run game coordinator at Indiana University. Last season, he helped lead the Hoosiers to an undefeated season and a national championship, adding another milestone to

Summer Greetings!
I feel this way every year, but it's hard to believe that we are nearing the end of July, which means that August and the start of school are just around the corner. I am beyond excited to be the superintendent of the district and have had a great first few weeks in the office. The kind words of support that I have received from many of you have been such a blessing.

As we gear up for the 2026-27 school year, building and grounds staff have been hard at work cleaning the buildings, and office staff have been busy preparing schedules and class lists. We have also begun work on a few much-needed maintenance projects. The middle school roof, which has been leaking for several years, is being replaced. Our camera and fob system, which can no longer be updated because the technology is expired, is being replaced. And our building and grounds crew have added a secure entrance to the elementary school building, which will prevent visitors from accessing the second floor without proper clearance.

Photo Day for upcoming school year will be Aug. 13

Parent Portal for online registration officially opened on July 13

As families begin preparing for the 2026-2027 school year, the Pardeeville Area School District is reminding parents and guardians of several important summer dates and back-to-school tasks that need to be completed before students return to class in September.

The Infinite Campus Parent Portal for the 2026-2027 school year officially opened on Monday, July 13. All parents and guardians must complete the online registration process and update student and parent information for the upcoming school year through the Parent Portal.

Families with students who are new to the district must contact their school office to begin the registration process. New student registration requires a birth certificate, proof of residency and a parent or guardian's photo ID.

Picture Day for all students will take place on Thursday, Aug. 13, at Pardeeville High School. Photos will be taken from 7 to 10 a.m. and again from 3 to 6 p.m. by Galley Studios.

District officials ask families to pay all school fees online prior to attending Picture Day. However, staff members will be available throughout the day on Aug. 13 to assist families with in-person payments or to answer questions.

High school fees for the 2026-2027 school year include a \$35 enrollment fee per student, a \$10 class fee per student and additional course fees for some elective classes. Middle school student fees include a \$25 enrollment fee per student. Elementary school fees include a \$20 enrollment fee per student, along with a \$9 recorder fee for 4th grade students.

Parents and guardians are also encouraged to use the Parent Portal to apply for free and reduced meals for the upcoming school year. Families can also make lunch account payments through the portal.

Families needing transportation services for their students should contact Smith Bus Service at 608-429-2732 or speak with representatives in person during the Aug. 13 Picture Day event.

The first day of the 2026-2027 school year will be Tuesday, Sept. 1, for kindergarten students, fifth grade students, ninth grade students and all new elementary school students. The first full day of school for all students will be Wednesday, Sept. 2.

Pardeeville students represent Wisconsin at Educators Rising National Conference

Ballweg and Pulvermacher finish in 10th in Children's Literature competition

Four Pardeeville High School students recently represented Wisconsin and the Pardeeville Area School District at the Educators Rising National Conference & Competition in Portland, Oregon, after qualifying for the national event earlier this year.

Pardeeville had six students qualify for the national competition, with Nadia Ballweg, Chayse Pulvermacher, Ava Wagner and Bailey Grissom making the trip to compete alongside some of the nation's top aspiring educators.

Ballweg and Pulvermacher earned an outstanding 10th-place finish in the Children's Literature competition. Wagner competed in the Interactive Bulletin Board event, while Grissom showcased her talents in the Educators Rising Moment competition.

In addition to competing, the students attended inspiring keynote presentations, participated in educational breakout sessions and connected with future educators from across the country. They also exchanged Wisconsin pins with fellow Educators Rising members from across the United States, building new friendships and learning about education programs in other states.

The trip also included opportunities to explore the Portland area. Students and advisors Crystal Huset and Morgan Serstad visited Washington Park, explored the world-famous Powell's Books, and hiked more than five miles in the scenic Multnomah Falls area.

The national conference provided students with valuable experiences both inside and outside the competition, allowing them to develop new ideas, strengthen their leadership skills and bring fresh inspiration back to Pardeeville's Educators Rising chapter.

The group returned home energized and excited to build on this year's success as they begin preparing for next year's Educators Rising National Conference & Competition.

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Pardeeville Schools going cell-phone free this school year

Policy changes made to promote safe, respectful learning environment

The Pardeeville Area School District has approved several policy updates for the 2026-2027 school year designed to promote a safe, respectful, and focused learning environment. Among the changes is a new cell phone-free school day at Pardeeville Middle School and Pardeeville High School. Beginning this fall, students will be expected to keep their cell phones and other personal electronic devices stored away in their locker and out of sight, from 8:00 a.m. until 3:20 p.m.

As 1-to-1 Chromebook schools, Pardeeville Middle School and Pardeeville High School provide students with the technology they need for classroom instruction. Because of this, personal electronic devices are generally not necessary during the school day.

Beginning this school year, all student cell phones and personal electronic devices—including smartwatches, iPods, personal computers, and similar technology—must be stored in student lockers by 8:00 a.m. and remain there until 3:20 p.m.

Cell phones and personal electronic devices are also strictly prohibited in locker rooms, bathrooms, or any other location where privacy is expected.

Parents and guardians who need to contact their child during the school day should call the office at the school their student attends. Likewise, if a student needs to contact a parent or guardian during the school day, they should do so through the school office.

Students who misuse a cell phone or electronic device during the school day will have the device confiscated and held by school personnel until the end of the school day. Repeated violations will result in a parent conference, and the student's device will be stored in the school office during the school day.

In addition to the updated electronic device policy, Pardeeville High School and Pardeeville Middle School have revised their student dress code. The updated dress code is designed to provide a safe and appropriate learning environment while allowing students opportunities for personal expression within reasonable guidelines.

Key expectations include:

- Clothing must provide adequate coverage and may not expose the midriff, cleavage, buttocks, undergarments, or unnecessarily reveal the underarm area.
- Skirts and shorts must be at least mid-thigh in length when standing.
- Tube tops, see-through clothing, and mesh garments are not permitted.
- Clothing or accessories displaying obscene, sexually suggestive, alcohol-related, tobacco-related, gang-related, drug-related, or violent words, images, or symbols are prohibited.
- Students must wear shoes at all times. Slippers and steel-toed shoes are not permitted.
- Sunglasses and head coverings, including hats, bandanas, and hoods, may not be worn in classrooms, hallways, or other

school buildings unless required for health or safety reasons.

- Pajamas, pajama pants, blankets, and other sleepwear are not permitted except during approved school spirit or dress-up days.
- Jackets and coats intended for outdoor weather should be stored in student lockers during the school day.
- Backpacks, purses, and detachable chains are not permitted during the school day and should remain in student lockers.

Students who do not comply with the dress code will be asked to correct the issue by changing clothing, wearing a garment provided by the school, or having appropriate clothing brought from home. Repeated violations may result in additional disciplinary consequences.

These updates reflect the District's commitment to creating learning environments where students can focus on learning with fewer distractions while maintaining a positive and respectful school culture. Families are encouraged to review both the updated electronic device policy and dress code with their students before the start of the school year.

Thank you for your continued partnership and support. We look forward to welcoming students back for another successful school year.

District launches new activities calendar through Bound

The Pardeeville Area School District has transitioned to a new online activities calendar, making it easier than ever for students, families and community members to stay up to date on school events.

The District is now using Bound as its official activities calendar. The new platform includes schedules for Pardeeville Middle School and High

School athletic events, as well as a variety of other school activities taking place throughout the year.

Visitors can browse upcoming events, view game schedules, check locations and times, and stay informed about changes throughout the school year. Families can also use the free Bound mobile app to access schedules and receive updates while on the go.

Summer maintenance projects improve safety and preserve district facilities

Residents may have noticed increased activity around the Pardeeville Area School District campus this summer as crews completed several important maintenance and security improvement projects designed to enhance safety and protect district facilities.

One of the largest projects is the replacement of the Pardeeville Middle School roof. The new roof replaces the original roof installed when the building opened around the turn of the century. The project includes nearly the entire building, with the exception of the gymnasium roof, and is expected to be completed by mid-August.

The District also is in the process of upgrading its security camera system and electronic fob readers throughout all school buildings. The previous system was installed following the 2012 referendum, but replacement parts for the aging cameras were no longer available. As cameras failed, certain areas of the buildings were left without security coverage. The new system restores and strengthens security throughout the district.

A third project added a new security door at the elementary school stairwell leading to the second floor. Located near the school's main entrance, the new door ensures that visitors cannot access the upper level of the building without first checking in through the elementary school office, adding another layer of protection for students and staff.

All three projects are being funded through the District's General Fund, meaning no additional taxpayer dollars are required to complete the work. These maintenance and security improvements are not part of the District's November referendum.

Looking ahead, the Pardeeville Area School District remains committed to addressing ongoing maintenance needs, including future roofing, parking lot repairs, and other facility improvements, through the General Fund and the Capital Expansion Fund whenever possible. This approach allows the District to continue maintaining its facilities while reserving referendum requests for larger projects identified as priorities by the community.

Cheer team, band show school spirit during 4th of July parade

The Pardeeville Area School District was well represented during the annual Pardeeville Fourth of July Parade as members of the Pardeeville High School Cheer Team and Pardeeville High School Band took part in the community celebration.

The annual parade provided students with an opportunity to celebrate Independence Day while representing their school and community. Their participation reflected the pride, spirit, and tradition that make the Pardeeville community special.

Pardeeville FFA celebrates successful week at state convention

The Pardeeville FFA Chapter earned numerous honors and celebrated the accomplishments of its members during the 2026 Wisconsin State FFA Convention, capping off another successful year for the chapter.

One of the week's biggest milestones came as Pardeeville alum Brooke Luedtke concluded her year of service as the Wisconsin State FFA Treasurer. Throughout the past year, Luedtke represented more than 27,000 FFA members across the state, serving as one of the organization's top student leaders.

The chapter also received a Gold National Chapter Award, qualifying Pardeeville FFA to advance to the National FFA Convention. In addition, the chapter placed fifth in Wisconsin in the Growing Leaders Division, recognizing its efforts to develop leadership opportunities for members.

Four Pardeeville FFA members were recognized as State Proficiency Award finalists for their outstanding Supervised Agricultural Experience projects. Taylor Luedtke earned the state championship in Swine Production – Placement and will advance to the national competition. Ava Wagner placed second in Nursery Operations – Placement, while Madi Holland finished fourth in Agricultural Sales – Placement and Macy Cross earned fourth place in Swine Production – Placement.

Three chapter members also received the prestigious Wisconsin State FFA Degree, the highest degree awarded by the Wisconsin FFA Association. Congratulations to Madi Holland, Taylor Luedtke and Ava Wagner on earning this distinguished honor.

Pardeeville FFA was also recognized with a Food For America Award for its efforts to educate elementary students about agriculture and where their food comes from through hands-on learning experiences.

The chapter had three teams compete in the Wisconsin FFA Leadership Development Events. The Agricultural Issues team earned a second-place finish, the Conduct of Chapter Meetings team placed seventh, and the Marketing team also competed at the state level. The students gained valuable experience while representing Pardeeville FFA among the state's top chapters.

In addition to the student accomplishments, Pardeeville Area School District Interim Superintendent Gus Knitt and Pardeeville High School Principal David Bell attended the convention and were recognized on stage for their support of the Pardeeville FFA Chapter.

The convention also marked a special milestone for Madi Holland, who signed her commitment to attend the University of Wisconsin–River Falls to study Agricultural Education, taking the next step toward becoming an agriculture teacher.

The Wisconsin State FFA Convention provided an opportunity for members to compete, celebrate achievements, build leadership skills and connect with FFA members from across the state. The many awards and recognitions earned throughout the week reflect the dedication, hard work and commitment of Pardeeville FFA students and advisors throughout the past year.

Pardeeville Summer School blends learning, creativity, and fun for students

Pardeeville Elementary School students kicked off their summer with three weeks of learning, exploration, and fun during the district's 2026 Summer School Program.

The program, held Monday through Thursday from 8 a.m. to noon during the first three weeks of June, offered students a variety of hands-on classes designed to keep them engaged, active, and learning throughout the summer.

One of the program's featured offerings was Getting Ready for Kindergarten, which helped last year's 4K students make a smooth transition into kindergarten. Through interactive activities, students became familiar with classroom routines while building early literacy and math skills and gaining confidence in their new school environment.

Students also had the opportunity to explore a wide range of interests through classes such as Lego Creations, Science, Computer Fun, Cooking and Cultures, Scrapbooking, and Arts and Crafts. Each course encouraged creativity, problem-solving, and hands-on learning.

For students looking to stay active, Summer School included popular sports and recreation classes in volleyball, basketball, track and field, and lifetime games, giving participants plenty of opportunities to develop skills while having fun with classmates.

Start preparing for a healthy and successful school year

Welcome back! Soon the halls will be full of conversation again. Good communication is essential to help students learn the best.

Registration is the first step and many of you have already started this process. Please make sure that the schools are aware of any and all health concerns that your student has. This allows us to better care for your student.

The Department of Public Instruction requires a "Licensed Medical Practitioner's" statement that will allow the Pardeeville Area School District to provide for your child's "Special Dietary needs." If your child needs a special diet, please take the form, that is in Infinite Campus, to your "Licensed Medical Practitioner" to have them fill it out. We need this form on file so we can provide your child the special diet required.

Next, if your student needs medication, prescription or nonprescription, please make sure the medication does not expire until after the school year is completed, June 2027. There are paper forms that need to be filled out for any medications taken during school hours. Forms can be found on E-Reg, the school's website, or at your building's office. All medications should be in the original container with the student's name on it (small bottles are helpful) and secured in the proper designated school's office space unless stated otherwise regarding the use of inhalers or auto injectors. Medications not picked up by June 30, 2026, have been destroyed. You may bring any forms and medications to us at registration and picture day on Aug. 13 and we will see that they get to the proper places.

Also, we are required to monitor and report to the State, in the first 40 school days, students who are not up to date on their immunizations. Therefore, we greatly appreciate your

assistance in letting us know if your child has received any vaccinations in the last year or is scheduled to receive vaccines. This will save you from getting calls from us, because we make every effort before we have to put your student's name on a noncompliant report to the State.

All kindergarten students will need documentation of the immunizations they have been given, and must be up to date with all of them. All 7th grade students will need a Tdap and all 7th grade and 12 grade students will need meningitis (Men ACWY) for school immunization requirements. Tdap vaccine: This continues protection against tetanus, diphtheria, and pertussis (whooping cough). Quadrivalent meningococcal conjugate (MCV4) (meningococcal ACWY) vaccine: This vaccine protects against infection from *Neisseria Meningitidis* in the lining of the brain, spinal cord, and bloodstream. Human papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine: This vaccine prevents some pre-cancers and cancers related to HPV. Pre-teens should get two doses before they turn 13 years old. A yearly flu vaccine: It protects against getting sick and spreading the flu virus. COVID-19 vaccines: Staying up to date on COVID-19 boosters will help prevent getting sick from COVID-19 and the Covid long-haul potential. Immunizations protect against and prevent the spread of diseases, however, please, contact us if you are in need of a waiver.

Nurses will be back for registration day on Aug. 13, and at the end of August to assist with any questions you may have.

ACADEMIC STANDARDS

The Pardeeville Area School District will be using the following academic standards for the 2026-2027 school year which are: Common Core standards for Mathematics and English Language Arts, including the Standards for Literacy for all Subjects. The Wisconsin Academic Standards will be used for Agriculture, Food and Natural Resources, Art and Design Education, Music, Personal Finance, Phy. Ed, Reading, Marketing Management and Entrepreneurship, Science*, Social Studies, Technology and Engineering, World Languages, Business and Info Technology, Early Learning Standards, Health Education, Health Science, and Information and Technology Literacy. *Science will be using Next Generation Science Standards. School counseling will be using Wisconsin Comprehensive School Counseling Model/ASCA.

STUDENT MEDICATION POLICY

All parents are asked to be aware of the district policy statement regarding the administering of medication to students during the school year.

The policy provides for school personnel to administer medication only when certain procedures are followed. Parents of children who require medication to be administered during the school day or who may find that to be the case during the school year, should check with the appropriate principal's office to make sure that authorization is properly provided. A parental approval form must be completed and on file before medication (including aspirin) can be administered.

Any questions regarding this policy should be referred directly to the appropriate building principal.

STUDENT RECORDS

The Pardeeville Area School District maintains student records for each student attending school in the District. These records include: (1) student progress records – courses taken, grades, immunization records, extracurricular activities and attendance; and, (2) student behavioral records – psychological tests, personality evaluations, records of conversations, written statements relating specifically to an individual student's behavior, tests relating specifically to achievement or measurement of ability, physical health records other than immunization records, law enforcement agency records obtained by the District and any other student records which are not progress records.

State and federal laws require that the maintenance of student records assure confidentiality. The District has also adopted a student records policy and procedures. This notice is subject to state and federal laws and the District's policy and procedures. Accordingly, the following shall apply in the District:

1. An adult student, or the parent(s) or guardian(s) of a minor student, has the right to inspect, review and obtain copies of the student's school records upon request in accordance with established District procedures. The District will respond to such requests without unnecessary delay. Copies of the District's student

records procedures are available upon request at the School District Office, 120 Oak Street, Pardeeville, WI. Regular office hours are 7:30 a.m.-3:30 p.m.

2. An adult student, or the parent(s) or guardian of a minor student, has the right to request the amendment of the student's school records if they believe the records are inaccurate, misleading or otherwise in violation of the student's privacy rights. Complaints regarding the content of student records may be made in accordance with established District procedures. Copies of the District's procedures are available upon request as outlined above.
3. An adult student, or the parent(s) or guardian(s) of a minor student, has the right to consent to the disclosure of information contained in the student's school records, except to the extent that state and federal laws authorize disclosure without consent. One exception that permits disclosure without consent is disclosure to school officials determined to have legitimate educational or safety interests in the records. A "school official" is a person employed by the District who is required by the Department of Public Instruction to hold a license; a law enforcement officer(s) who is individually designated by the school board and assigned to the school district; a person employed by or working on behalf of the District as an administrator, supervisor, instructor or support staff member (including health or medical staff and policy-school liaison personnel); a person serving on the School Board; a person or company with whom the District has contracted to perform a specific task (such as an attorney, independent hearing officer, auditor, medical consultant or therapist); or a person serving on an official committee such as a disciplinary or grievance committee, or assisting another school official in performing their tasks. A school official has a "legitimate educational interest" if the official needs to review a student record in order to fulfill their professional or District responsibility. The District also, upon request, forwards a student's records to another school without consent in accordance with state law for purposes related to the student's enrollment or transfer. District procedures outline the specific reasons for disclosure without consent and are available upon request as outlined above.
4. An adult student, or the parent(s) or guardian(s) of a minor student, has the right to file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education for alleged District noncompliance with federal Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) requirements. The name and address of the office that administers FERPA is: Family Policy Compliance Office, U.S. Department of Education, 400 Maryland Avenue, SW, Washington, DC 20202-5920.

Further, the School Board has designated the following student record information as directory data: student's name, address, telephone listing, date and place of birth, major field of study, participation in officially recognized activities and

sports, weight and height of members of athletic teams, dates of attendance, photographs, degrees and awards received and name of school most recently previously attended by the student. This information may be disclosed to any person unless the adult student, or parent, legal guardian or guardian ad litem of a minor student informs the school that all or any part of the directory data may not be released without the prior consent of the adult student, parent, legal guardian or guardian ad litem. The District will not release directory data earlier than two weeks (14 days) after receipt of this notice or the opening of school.

SECONDARY SCHOOL STUDENTS

A secondary school student or the parent(s)/guardian(s) of the student may request that the student's name, school district assigned email address and telephone listing not be released to military recruiters or institutions of higher education without prior written parental consent. The District shall comply with such request.

Unless access to such information has been restricted by the secondary school student or the student's parent(s)/guardian(s) as outlined above, the District shall provide access to secondary school students' names, school district assigned email addresses and telephone listings, on request made by military recruiters or institutions of higher education. The District shall also provide military recruiters the same access to secondary school students as provided generally to post-secondary educational institutions or to prospective employers of those students.

EARLY COLLEGE CREDIT PROGRAM

Junior and Senior students are allowed to enroll in one or more nonsectarian courses at an accredited 2 or 4-year school of higher education while a high school student. Courses must further the student's education academically or vocationally. Students may not take courses that are comparable to ones offered at Pardeeville High School. Our district pays for the cost of tuition, texts, and materials; transportation is not included. Because of cost factors, our district will carefully screen applications for appropriateness and deny payment when deadlines are not observed. To be considered for the Early College Credit Program during the first semester, the application must be submitted to the school board by March 1 of the previous year; for second semester enrollment, the application is due by October 1 of the school year. Students interested should contact their school counselor.

SPECIAL EDUCATION NOTICE

The local educational agency annually publicizes information about its special education procedures and services. NOTICE TO STUDENTS AND PARENTS DIRECTORY INFORMATION

According to the Board of Education policy, the following items involving students are considered directory information and may be utilized by the school district in the newspaper, in activity and athletic programs, and other school communications: student's name; activity participation; height and weight in athletic activities; photographs, honors, degrees, and awards; name of school most recently attended; student's grade in school; parent or guardian's name. In accordance with Wis. Stat. § 118.07(6)(b) and the Wisconsin Public Records Law (Subchapter II of Chapter 19), the Pardeeville Area School District hereby notifies parents and guardians of their right to access certain records regarding school employee discipline.

1. Right to Access Records Under the Wisconsin Public Records Law, any person has the right to request and inspect public records maintained by the District. This includes records related to the discipline of school employees, subject to certain legal limitations and the "balancing test" (where the public's interest in disclosure is weighed against the interest in non-disclosure).
2. Limitations and Confidentiality Please be advised that while disciplinary records are generally accessible once an investigation has concluded, certain information may be redacted or withheld as required by law, including:
 - Records related to a current investigation into possible employee misconduct (until the investigation is finalized).
 - Information that would identify a student (protected under FERPA and state pupil record laws).
 - Personal identifying information such as home addresses, social security numbers, or private medical information.
3. Employee Notification Rights Per Wis. Stat. § 19.356, before the District releases records regarding an investigation into employee discipline or a possible violation of law/policy, the District may be required to notify the employee. This notice allows the employee a specific period to seek a court order to restrain the release of the records or only the right to augment the records, depending on the category of the employee under the records law.

RELEASE STATEMENT

The Pardeeville Area School District today announced its policy for children unable to pay the full price of meals served under the National School Lunch Program and School Breakfast Program or milk for split-session students served under the Special Milk Program. Each school office and the central office has a copy of the policy, which may be reviewed by any interested party. The following household size and income criteria will be used for determining eligibility. Children from families whose annual income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free and reduced price meals or free milk if a split-session student does not have access to the school lunch or breakfast service.

Application forms are being sent to all homes with a notice to parents or guardians. To apply for free or reduced price meals or free milk, households must fill out the application and return it to the school (unless notified at the start of the school year that children are eligible through direct certification). Additional copies are available at the office in each school. The information provided on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and may be verified at any time during the school year by agency or other program officials. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

To obtain free or reduced price meals or free milk for children in a household where one or more household members receive FoodShare, Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR), or Wisconsin Works (W-2) cash benefits, list the FoodShare, FDPIR or W-2 case number, program name, list the names of all school children, sign the application, and return it to the school office.

For the school officials to determine eligibility for free or reduced price meals or free milk of households not receiving FoodShare, FDPIR or W-2 cash benefits, the household must provide the following information requested on the application: names of all household members, total number of household members, and the adult signing the application form must also list the last four digits of his or her Social Security Number or mark the box to the right of "Check if no SSN". Also, the income received by each household member must be provided by amount and source (wages, welfare, child support, etc.).

Under the provisions of the free and reduced price meal and free milk policy the district food service secretary will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent or guardian is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official, he/she may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis. If the parent/guardian wishes to make a formal appeal, he/she may make a request either orally or in writing to: Superintendent Amber Denure, 120 Oak St., Pardeeville, WI 53954, (608)429-2153x 213. If a hearing is needed to appeal the decision, the policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure.

If a household member becomes unemployed or if the household size changes, the family should contact the school. Such changes may make the household eligible for reduced price meals or free meals or free milk if the household income falls at or below the levels shown above, and they may reapply at that time.

Children formally placed in foster care are also eligible for free meal benefits. Foster children may be certified as eligible without a household application. Households with foster children and non-foster children may choose to include the foster child as a household member, as well as any personal income available to the foster child, on the same application that includes their non-foster children.

The information provided by the household on the application is confidential. Public Law 103-448 limits the release of student free and reduced price school meal eligibility status to persons directly connected with the administration and enforcement of federal or state educational programs. Consent of the parent/guardian is needed for other purposes such as waiver of textbook fees.

Mr. Bell discussed the plan, career awareness for all grade levels and the goals that the school district has. It was advised that DPI just opened up some more opportunities for students to receive certificates from certain classes, which our staff would have to get certified to teach, as well as possible funding back to the school district if we were able to provide those classes.

The project as of right now will consist of the Balliett building tear down and addition to the middle school, the high school building kitchen and cafeteria remodel as well as possible air conditioning throughout the district. Mr. Nickel asked if there had been a temperature study done to support the need for the air conditioning, to which Mr. Knitt stated there had not been as of yet, and they will work on that. Mr. Nickel also suggested rebranding the high school kitchen label to the district kitchen to help the community understand that this particular kitchen services the whole district. The team thought that was possible to do. Ms. Ives asked about budgeting if there is a

way that we can come in under budget, to which it was advised that the proposed numbers are on the high end of things to make sure we could complete the projects, and they anticipate at this time to come in under budget. Ms. Levzow inquired about the gyms and their air conditioning needs, to see if they were included in the pricing and decide if we need air conditioning in the gyms or not.
