MESSAGE FROM INTERIM SUPERINTENDENT GUS KNITT

It's an exciting time to be back helping Pardeeville Schools

hen I wrote my final article in the June, 2021 Pardeeville Area School District Newsletter, I thought that was my final correspondence with you. But, as you can see, I am back. The Board of Education hired me as the Interim District Administrator. I will serve in this role until the Board of Education hires a new Superintendent, who will begin in 2026.

The Board of Education, at its Sept. 15 board meeting, hired the Wisconsin Association of School Boards to conduct the search for a new superintendent. The Board will be meeting with the consultant from the Wisconsin Association of School Boards in October to establish a calendar for the hiring process, which will include a

posting date for the job, an application deadline, and interview schedule.

I will be in the School District on a part-time basis. During my time in Pardeeville, I will be working on preparation for the referendum, that is planned for November, 2026, and help the Board of Education prepare for the new superintendent search, along with the normal daily activities of a superintendent.

It is exciting to be back in the Pardeeville Area School District. While some things have changed since I was here the last time, what hasn't changed are the outstanding students, a great staff, a Board of Education that wants quality education for all students, and a welcoming community.

Forestry students get lesson on tree identification

Pardeeville High School Agri-Science Teacher Meagan Vujnovich believes that some of the best lessons happen outside the classroom—and her Forestry students got to experience that firsthand on a recent sunny morning.

Vujnovich took her class outdoors to explore the trees growing right on the high school campus. Equipped with a dichotomous key, students worked in pairs and small groups to carefully observe leaves, bark, and branching patterns. Using these clues, they practiced the process of tree identification and discovered the variety of species rooted just steps away from their classroom.

Hands-on activities like this not only strengthen students' understanding of forestry concepts, but also keep them active and engaged. Vujnovich says she looks for opportunities to take advantage of nice weather to get her students moving, adding that these real-world experiences make learning more meaningful—and a lot more fun.

Why we are asking students to put phones away at school

Research shows restricting access to cell phones helps students focus

n recent years, teachers across the U.S. have shared a common concern: students seem less able to stay focused than in the past. A 2024 survey found that more than half of K-8 teachers reported their students' ability to read for long stretches of time has "decreased a lot" since 2019, with nearly another third saying it has "decreased a little" (Willingham). Schools suspect that distractions from digital technology – including cellphones – play a role.

Research supports the idea that digital devices are more than just occasional distractions – they may be changing how young people approach attention itself. Daniel Willingham's review in Education Next observes a modest but consistent correlation: students who use digital devices more intensively tend to show weaker attention regulation (Willingham). Over time, frequent shifts between apps or social media feeds may train the brain to expect constant stimulation, making it harder to stay on task when working is more demanding or less

immediately gratifying. This dynamic can make routine academic tasks feel boring or slow by comparison (Willingham).

For these reasons, restricting cellphone access during the school day helps us create an environment where students can build their capacity for sustained attention. When phones are unavailable – especially during full periods of class – students are less able to compare the immediate allure of digital content with their current schoolwork. Over time, this helps reset expectations about what kinds of activities are engaging, and improves readiness for deeper learning (Willingham).

Over the coming months, in this district newsletter, we will share more information exploring related topics such as: how to build attention skills, strategies to reduce distractions, and what research says about screen time in and outside of school. We hope these pieces help families, students, and staff understand the importance of putting away the technology during the school day.


The book fair will be open to the public from 3:15 to 4:30 p.m. on Monday,

Local corn maze honors memory of Pardeeville student

This fall, Creek Bed Farmacy in Poynette is paying tribute to the memory of Pardeeville High School student Lorelei Hepler with a special corn maze design called "Off to Neverland."

Lorelei, who passed away in a car accident last January, was not only a beloved student and active member of the Pardeeville Drama Club, but also an employee at Creek Bed Farmacy. Last fall, she shared her vision for the farm's 2025 corn maze, suggesting a Peter Pan theme. Following her passing, the Creek Bed Farmacy team chose to honor her wishes and bring her idea to life.

The maze features iconic Peter Pan elements, including Tinker Bell, the Pirate Ship, and Peter Pan and Wendy, along with a deeply personal touch: the 10-foot-tall letters "LH." According to a post on the farm's Facebook page, these letters serve as "a quiet tribute to someone very special – our own 'amazing girl' that we had the honor and privilege of getting to know."

Lorelei's love for theater made the Peter Pan theme especially meaningful. Last fall, she played the role of Mrs. Darling in Pardeeville High School Drama Club's production of Peter/Wendy. Outside of school, she often attended plays and musicals, further showing her passion for the stage.

By following Lorelei's vision for the corn maze, Creek Bed Farmacy has created a living tribute—one that cele-

Over 350 people attend event

On Wednesday, Sept. 24, Pardeeville High School was buzzing with energy as it hosted the Wisconsin FFA Section 6 Fall Leadership Workshop. More than 350 FFA members and advisors from area schools came together under this year's theme, "Better Together."

The evening featured workshops on leadership and chapter management skills tailored for different officer roles, giving students practical tools to bring back to their own chapters. As part of the program, Wisconsin State FFA Officers—including 2023 PHS graduate Brook Luedtke—introduced themselves and performed a skit that highlighted the importance of teamwork and collaboration.

The Section 6 Workshop is part of the Wisconsin FFA's Fall Leadership Workshops, a statewide series of regional events designed to strengthen leadership development and chapter engagement. Other workshops this fall were held at Cochrane-Fountain City, Bloomer, Stanley-Boyd, Loyal, Prairie du Chien, DeForest, Beaver Dam, New Holstein, and New London.

The Pardeeville FFA extends a big thank you to all the donors who provided an amazing meal, the volunteers who helped the event run smoothly, and the PHS staff for graciously allowing the use of classrooms during the workshop.

Work on new greenhouse project begins at high school

Exciting progress is happening on the south side of the Pardeeville High School campus as construction has begun on a brand-new greenhouse. Work officially kicked off in late August when ground was broken for the 24-by-40-foot facility, located near the high school parking lot and maintenance shed.

The project is the result of an incredible community effort. In just 11 months, the Pardeeville Agriculture and Food Science Department raised all \$108,000 needed to make the greenhouse a reality, thanks to generous donations from local businesses and supporters.

The greenhouse is expected to be operational by January 1, providing students with a hands-on learning space during the winter months. Additional projects, including a surrounding fence and raised garden beds for a school garden, are planned for completion in the spring.

A grand opening celebration is set to take place on Friday, May 9, during the annual Spring Plant Sale. Community members will be invited to tour the new greenhouse, honor the donors who made it possible, and purchase plants grown by students.

Staying healthy, staying in school key to classroom success

Now that a month of school has already passed, in the nursing office, we are already seeing students with coughs, sore throats, and stomach issues. Always the best way to protect ourselves against germs is good hand washing, especially before we eat. Eating a well-balanced diet, three meals a day with snacks, getting plenty of exercise, and a routine bedtime with 8-10 hours of sleep, will also be helpful in our fight against germs and viruses. Healthy kids learn more because they are in school.

The school policy is, if your student is ill, they should stay home. There are many viruses out there. For instance; pertussis, influenza (flu), respiratory syncytial virus (RSV), covid, strep throat, and so many more. It is important to remember, if you take your child to the doctor or if your child is absent three days or more, that you get a medical note for attendance purposes.

There are changes regarding immunizations going on at the federal level. However, our compliance requirements have not changed. Students still need to have their immunizations. Kindergarteners on up have various requirements. Last year it became required that the 7th graders need a Tdap & Meningitis ACWY and 12th graders need a Meningitis ACWY. So, if your child has received a vaccination since the last time you have given us their immunization record, please let us know. The Wisconsin Immunization Registry is also checked on a regular basis.

We know historically, disease wiped out families and communities, but due to vaccination, we have prevented such tragedy. Also, know that if your child is not properly vaccinated, they can be excluded from school, if for example, we get cases of measles at school. Consult with your medical provider, to get the best protection for your student and those around them.

Math class looked a little different for Pardeeville Middle School students earlier this September. On a sunny afternoon, 8th grade math teacher Mike Craig moved his classroom outside for a hands-on lesson about graphing.


With ropes stretched across the ground to create an X and Y axis, students became part of a human graph. Each student had to solve equations, find their correct coordinate point, and take their place on the grid. Working together, they built coordinate planes, formed straight lines, and even created a parabola.

The interactive activity helped students visualize how equations look when plotted and gave them a memorable way to practice concepts like coordinate planes, proportional relationships, and data sets.

Another favorite activity in Mr. Craig's class-room is what he calls a "desk review." For this exercise, students are allowed to do something they normally never can—write directly on their desks. Using dry-erase markers, students solve problems written on the whiteboard by working them out on the tops of their desks. Not only does this make the review more fun, but it also gives Mr. Craig the ability to quickly see each student's thinking as he walks around the room. It's a win-win for both students and teacher.

Through creative, hands-on activities like these, Mr. Craig is showing his students that math can be both engaging and enjoyable — whether they're outside or inside at their desks.

With the Bulldog Games setting the tone, students, staff, and families were looking forward to a spirited week of celebrations leading up to the Homecoming football game.




