Pardeeville gives alum Mark Bortz fitting tribute

Super Bowl champ, '79 grad has his jersey retired during pregame ceremony

On Friday, Aug. 23, the Pardeeville Area School District honored one of its most distinguished alumni, Mark Bortz, by retiring his No. 75 jersey. Bortz, a 1979 graduate of Pardeeville High School, went on to play football at the University of Iowa before an illustrious career in the NFL with the Chicago Bears, including a victory in Super Bowl XX.

Though Bortz was unable to attend the ceremony in person, his family proudly represented him during the event, held prior to the start of Pardeeville's season-opening football game against Necedah. Many community members, including some sporting their vintage Mark Bortz jerseys, filled the stands to witness the honor.

A large No. 75 with Bortz's name was unveiled on the side of the press box, symbolizing his lasting presence at the school. Inside Pardeeville High School, a framed jersey will now hang, forever memorializing Bortz's achievements and reminding future generations of the pride he brought to the district.

The event marked a significant moment for the school and community, paying tribute to one of Pardeeville's finest athletes and celebrating his exceptional journey from small-town Wisconsin to the heights of NFL glory.

During the formative years of my career as a professional educator, there was a certain element of joy and wonder over the inescapable fact that I was making a decent living helping kids learn to love music. Despite the long days, numerous weekends on the road for show choir competitions, gallons of sweat poured out onto the marching band field, and almost complete absence of free time available for the maintenance of my own musical skills, I truly loved being a band teacher. It was the time spent making music with students that was the most memorable.

Looking back on those first few years, I can honestly say that the best days (and there were too many to count) were those that were filled with laughter. After all, the students and I were having fun making music together. There was a shared sense of pride, passion, and belonging through which strong emotional connections were built, and many of those have withstood the grueling test of time.

For example, I still stay in touch with the high school trombone player who playfully kicked a pothole filled with snow melt at me while street marching on an anomalously warm day in March. Of course, I quickly returned fire. There may or may not have been some collateral damage inflicted upon several other innocent members of the band, too. The finer details have become a bit hazy in retrospect; however, when we finally returned to school (visibly soaked), the entire group was laughing so hard that the principal joked about whether or not we stopped at the local tavern while out on our route through the village.

Despite the unintended shenanigans of that day, the band and I became much more united through this experience and

demonstrated a strong showing in the spring community parades as a result. Lesson learned: Human beings can genuinely enjoy their time together while discovering a mutual love of learning. Isn't that what education is supposed to be about?

Fast forward to today, my life (and career) has undergone a complete metamorphosis. Instead of being responsible for an instrumental music program and its nearly 100 students, I find myself juggling the demands of managing an entire school district that encompasses nearly 900 students, one-hundred staff members, and an annual budget that exceeds \$15 million. If this all sounds way too serious to elicit any laughter or fun, you would be correct, at least on some days.

Although we are particularly blessed with an incredibly supportive community here in Pardeeville, I have personally borne witness to a profession in which there were once 200 (or more) applicants for an open position. Over time, and especially since WI Act 10, this has given way to an environment where critical positions sometimes go unfilled, primarily due to an ongoing shortage of licensed, qualified, and experienced applicants. Make no mistake, whether or not this current climate was deliberately manufactured by those who make financial and policy decisions at the state and federal level, it is now the harsh reality that we must grapple with collectively until meaningful investments are once again made regarding public education. Bottom line: There is simply not enough money and resources to meet the current needs of our students.

But please take to heart that there is ALWAYS some really good news in a world that tends to gravitate towards the negative side of reality, especially when we lose sight of what is really important (or become obsessed with issues that are beyond our control). Even though my lifelong passion for supporting every student's right to a high quality public education has not diminished one iota since those early days as a music educator, the realization and appreciation that none of this happens by accident has never not been lost on me since becoming a district administrator. An 'attitude of gratitude' and unwavering commitment to discovering reasons to laugh with school staff, students, and community members continues to drive my own passion and purpose as a professional educator.

As we embark on another year of adventures in learning, I give thanks and kudos to the wonderful staff right here in Pardeeville who make all the difference over whether or not our kids are excited about coming to school. We must continue to nurture a love of learning in ALL students while cherishing abundant opportunities to share laughter and joy with everyone in our school. After all, ISN'T LEARNING SUPPOSED TO BE FUN!?!?

Fall concert will be Oct. 21



Washing hands, getting sleep keys to having healthy school year

www.where did summer go? It is very exciting to see and hear students and staff enthusiastically engaging in the various buildings.

In the nursing office, we are already seeing students with various symptoms. Always the best way to protect ourselves against germs is good hand washing, especially before we eat. Eating a well balanced diet, three meals a day with snacks, getting plenty of exercise, and a routine bedtime with 8-10 hours of sleep will also be very helpful in our fight against germs and viruses.

The school policy is if your student is ill, they should stay home. There are many viruses out there, like Pertussis, influenza (flu), Respiratory Syncytial Virus (RSV), Covid, Strep Throat, and so many more. It is important to

ing office is diligently

working on getting students in compliance in regards to their immunizations. There are new requirements this year: 7th graders need a Tdap & Meningitis ACWY and 12th graders need a Meningitis ACWY. Several students have had them already but now it is a state requirement for the schools. So, if your child has received a vaccination since the last time you have given us their immunization record, please let us know. The Wisconsin Immunization Registry is also checked on a regular basis. We know historically, disease wiped out families and communities, but due to vaccination, we have prevented such tragedy. Consult with your medical provider, to get the best protection for your student and those around them.



Bulldogs face huge game in Cambridge

The first half of the season for the Pardeeville varsity football team couldn't have gone much better. The Bulldogs opened the season a perfect 5-0 and have outscored their opponents 223-16 during that stretch.

Pardeeville's success has also gotten the attention of those outside Pardeeville, as the Bulldogs moved up to No. 6 in Division 6 in the Wissports. net Coaches Poll following their 42-0 victory in Poynette on Sept. 20.

Leading the Bulldogs on offense this season has been senior quarterback Logan Young. Through five games, Young is the team's leading rusher with 590 yards and nine touchdowns on the ground. Young has also thrown for 460 yards and five touchdowns without tossing an interception through those first five games. Much like last season, Jamison Wickersham has been Young's favorite target in the passing game. The senior has 17 receptions for 263 yards and four touchdowns in victories over Necedah, New Lisbon, Marshall, Fall River/Rio and Poynette.

On defense, Pardeeville's leading tacklers through five games has been junior Kingston Galetka with 29 tackles and seniors Caleb Mackey (25 tackles) and Ashton Whitehorse (23 tackles). Senior Nick Sween has intercepted four passes through five games to lead the Pardeeville secondary.

Pardeeville's hot start has set it up for a huge game against Cambridge on Oct. 4. Both teams were undefeated through five games, and Cambridge was ranked fifth – one spot ahead of Pardeeville – in the Week 5 Wissports. net Coaches Poll in Division 6. The winner will more than likely be your 2024 Eastern Suburban Conference Champion.


